Here at CH&S, our students use activity kits for many reasons:

- Activity kits teach stick-to-it-iveness which is the ability to stick to a project for a certain period of time. This is a great employment readiness skill.
- Sorting tasks such as putting all of the pink crayons together in the pink crayon "box" or velcroing matching fruits to the fruit card and the airplane, car, or train to the vehicle card are excellent discrimination and dexterity exercises.
- Activity kits can be very soothing or calming, and they can give us time to unwind.

Many of our students use activity kits, and some help assemble them. Here, Amy helps Darnell assemble some sorting kits. This was a multi-day project, and Amy helped laminate a lot of kit components! We appreciate your help with this project, Amy!

Research has shown that engaging in creative activities can improve memory and cognitive flexibility. By challenging your brain in new ways, you can help keep it healthy and active – no matter how old (or young) you are!

If you think laminating activity kit components is not creative, you have not tried to laminate 8 or 10 different colored crayon boxes and crayons at the same time. Fitting the boxes and crayons onto the laminating sheets without letting them move around/overlap proved most challenging to some (Thea).

Assembling these kits for others and working collaboratively in a group made this project so much more enjoyable. Great job, Amy!

with Jennifer



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KNOWLEDGE CLASS: EEK! BATS!

April 17th is Bat Appreciation Day, here is a bat knowledge class to mark the occasion:

*Flying Mammal: Bats are the ONLY mammals that can fly! (Flying squirrels can't actually fly, even though flying is in their names–they just glide.) One in five mammal species is a bat–that's 20% of mammals!

*Matters of Size: Bats range greatly in size depending on species. The world's smallest bat is one of the smallest mammals in the world-Kitti's hog-nosed bat is just a little over an inch long and weighs less than a penny. On the other end of the size spectrum are golden-crowned flying foxes, which have one of the longest wingspans in the world. They can measure up to 5'6" long! Which begged the question: are we taller than a bat? Nino, Katie, Martha, Cat, Colleen, and Jennifer are NOT, in fact, taller than a bat.

*Bat Snacks: What (and how) do bats eat? Bats are nocturnal, and when they hunt at night they use echolocation to find insects. Bats make sounds that bounce off objects, then listen for clues about what's ahead. Some bats, like the greater bulldog bat, which is named for its dog-like face, use this sonar to catch fish. Other species of bats, like the New Zealand lesser short-tailed bat, crawl on the ground in search of a diverse variety of food, including nectar, pollen, berries, and bugs. The desert long-eared bat eats scorpions, stingers and all, and doesn't seem to be bothered when it's stung in the face, even by scorpions with venom strong enough to kill a human! Yikes!

*Bat Myths: Eek! Bats have rabies! FALSE. According to the CDC, only 5-6% of bats have rabies, so it's very rare. Eek! Bats are blind! FALSE. You may have heard the saying "blind as a bat", but bats' eyes work just fine. Even bats that use echolocation to find their food have vision. Some bats, such as fruit bats, actually search for food using sight and smell. Eek! Bats fly in hair! FALSE. Some people freak out thinking bats want to nest in their hair, but bats have no interest whatsoever in hair. They don't even make nests. Eek! Bats are pests! FALSE. Bats EAT pests, actually! A single bat can eat up to a thousand mosquitos in a night.

GONE BATTY!

*Bat Benefits: Why would you want to attract bats to your yard? There are benefits to having bats hanging around your house, pun intended. Not only do they eradicate pests, they pollinate and fertilize plants. Bats eat many insects that might cause problems in the garden-pesky mosquitoes, caterpillars, moths, gnats, and flying beetles. Who needs insecticide when you've got bats? Cheers to bats! Next time you have a margarita, raise a glass to bats-they are the only pollinators of agave, the plant that makes tequila. To attract bats to your yard, plant night-blooming flowers such as tuberose and moonflower. You can even call it a moon garden-cool, huh?
