From 1716 to 1726, during the Golden Age of Piracy, thousands of sailors and privateers, unemployed by the end of the war of the Spanish Succession, turned en masse to piracy. Because pirates made their living by terrorizing, they were viewed in a very negative light.

The pop culture conception of pirates was born during this time. Tall tales and legends surrounded the most famous buccaneers like Blackbeard, Captain Kidd, Black Bart, Calico Jack, and others. As pirates began to appear in popular literary works, the public perception of swashbucklers began to change.

Artist Peter Coffin's aluminum "Untitled (Pirate)" has two hook hands, two peg legs, two patched eyes, two drawn swords; two parrots, one on each shoulder. It was created in 2007 and cast in 2009 and according to the SF Chronicle, "it glitters, either boastfully or self-confidently."

According to the artist, the pirate should stand "strong as a timeless hero or anti-hero here to defy authority and the status quo. 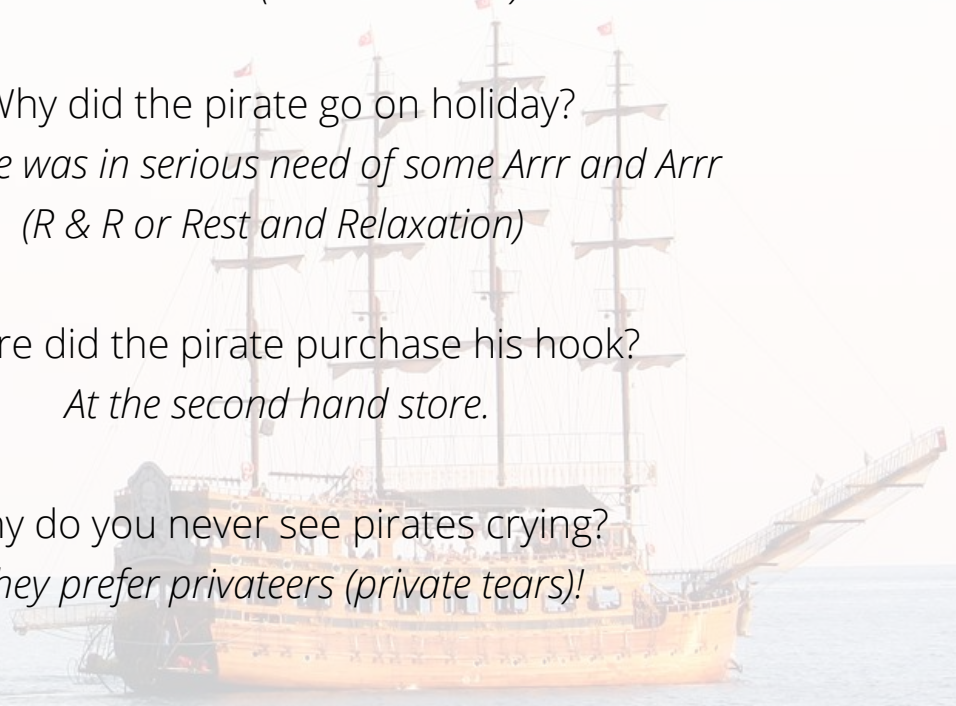

History of the Pirate Flag

What images come to mind when you think “pirate”? Hooks? Parrots? Striped pants? Eye patches? Treasure chests? How about the skull and crossbones? The famously menacing flag, also known as the “Jolly Roger” is an enduring symbol of piracy, but what are its origins? Let’s find out!

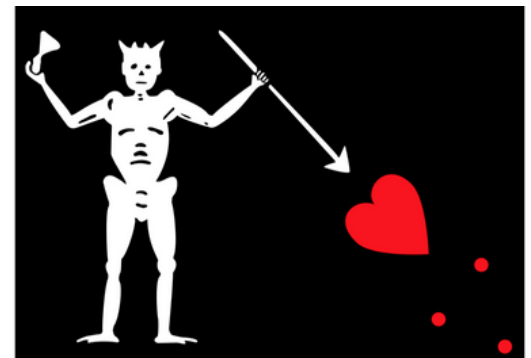
While the skull and crossbones may be the image we’re most familiar with, there were actually many types of flags flown by pirates during the Golden Age of Piracy. Hearts (impaled by darts or otherwise), skulls/skeletons, hourglasses, and swords were all commonly found on pirate’s flags during that era. The images almost always appeared on a black or red field, and they were usually placed in the center without any concern for pattern or repetition.

Pirates generally didn’t fly flags until they were in range of the prey ship, at which point they’d raise the Jolly Roger and fire a warning shot. By raising their flag, the pirates hoped to elicit surrender from the prey ship. The pirates also usually carried a variety of flags to fly in different situations because, you know, they’re pirates and they might have to pretend to be something other than pirates if they came across a naval vessel. In those days, it was a capital offense to be a pirate, after all.

In the early 1900s, Admiral Sir Arthur Wilson of the British Royal Navy decided steam submarines—still a somewhat new technology at the time—were unfair to use in war. To counter this he suggested the British Navy label all enemy combatants caught in submarines as pirates. The goal being capital punishment for those employing the underwater menace.



Edward Low, the notorious English pirate, flew a red skeleton flag from his ship’s mast.



"The Flag of Blackbeard" is often attributed to the famous pirate, there is no official record of Blackbeard ever using it. The only flags we definitely knew he employed were either all black, or “blood flags” (see below)



The “Blood Flag” meant “no quarter given” - a warning to enemies that no mercy would be shown to them. Conversely, a “Black Flag” meant those who surrendered would be spared.

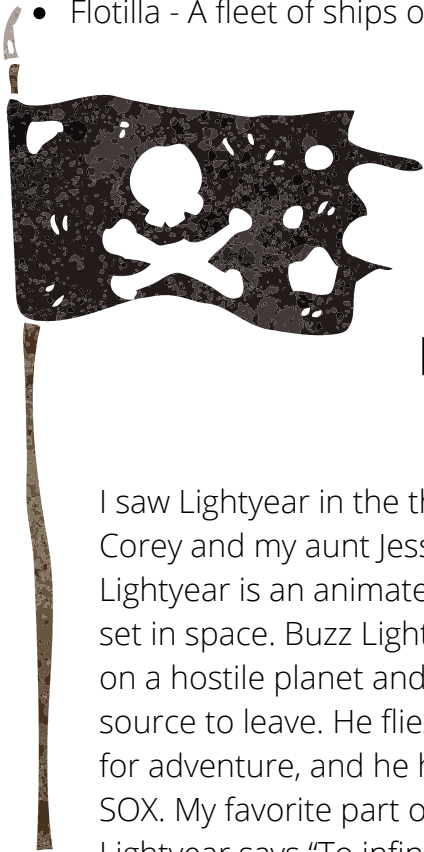
The Jolly Roger then became associated with submarine warfare. In World War II, a British submarine called the HMS Osiris sank an Italian Palestro. As a commendation for the achievement, the flotilla leader had a Jolly Roger made specially for the HMS Osiris. From that point on in the war Jolly Rogers were affixed to submarines that had sunk enemy ships.

Vexillology

Now there's an interesting word. *Vexillology* is the study of flags, including their history, symbolic value, and usage around the world. A person who studies flags is what's called a *vexillologist*, while a flag designer is known as a *vexillographer*. The art of flag making is called *vexillography*.

Flags are usually made up of simple shapes and symbols arranged intentionally on a "field", or background. They are also usually rectangular, though Nepal, Switzerland, and Vatican City have bucked that trend. Every flag is different, of course, but let's take a look at one and see what we can learn:



Look familiar? Mexico's current flag was adopted on September 16th, 1968. The green, white, and red color blocks represent Mexico's independence from Spain. The image in the center is Mexico's coat of arms: a golden eagle perched on a cactus with a rattlesnake in its beak. The coat of arms is based on an Aztec legend in which the country's people knew where to build the city of Tenochtitlan/Mexico City when they saw an eagle eating a snake at a lake.

Fun fact: No country's flag uses **purple**, as purple dye was once very hard to get.

Kiwifruit (all one word) originated in China and are sometimes called *Chinese gooseberries* since they are, technically, a berry. New Zealand was the first country outside of China to start growing the fruit. In the 1960s, America started to receive shipments of Chinese gooseberries and changed the name to "kiwifruit" because of the resemblance to the brown, fuzzy kiwi bird–New Zealand's national bird.



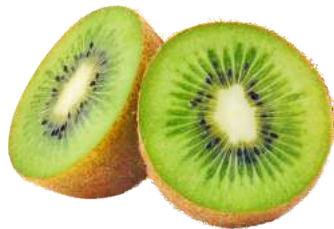

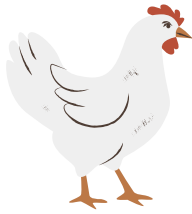
- The hum of the light saber was derived from a film projector combined with feedback from a broken TV.
- Ben recorded his own breathing in an old Dacor scuba regulator for the sound of Darth Vader's breathing.
- Ben Burt also did the sound of E.T. where he made the voice of the main character by using the voice of an elderly woman he met at a photography shop.



- The background noise of the aliens in the cantina in episode 4 of the Star Wars series was made by people using helium.

Ahoy Maties: Female Pirates

We all know what pirates look like—a man with an eye patch, maybe a peg leg, and a big beard. But did you know that there were women that were pirates too? Some of the most formidable characters were women. Here are a few of the most notorious:

Cheng I Sao

The name Cheng I Sao is known as "Wife of Cheng" in the Chinese language. Cheng I Sao met her husband, already a powerful pirate, when she was working at a brothel. They married in 1801 and it was the pirate's life for her. They became an infamous pirate team, with an enterprise that boasted 50,000 men.

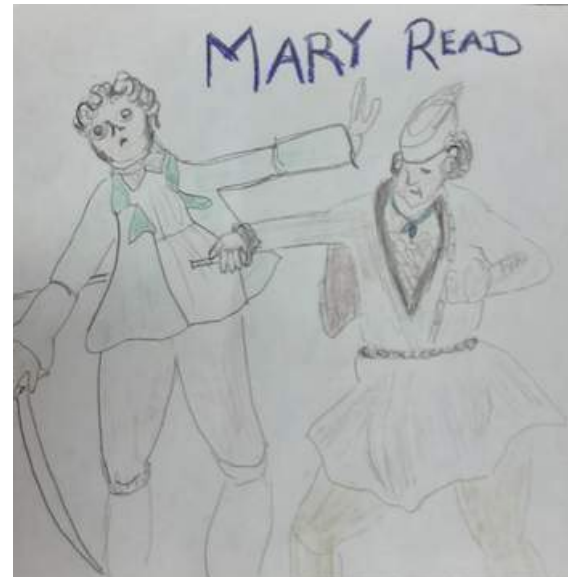
In 1807, Cheng passed away, leaving Cheng I Sao a widow. Did she stop her pirating ways? No way! She continued pirating and teamed up with a new partner, Chang Pao. Cheng I Sao became public enemy #1, but she also took care of her staff/co-pirates/crew via a rigorous code of conduct which protected her crew from assault by other pirates.

In 1810, Cheng I Sao made a kind of truce, agreeing to surrender her fleet and stop fighting in exchange for being able to keep her loot. She retired as one of the most successful pirates ever to grace the seas!

Mary Read

Mary Read was born in England in the late 17th century. Her mother coerced her into disguising herself as her deceased half-brother in order to scam relatives for money. Mary eventually adopted the name Mark Read and worked in several different traditionally male jobs.

Mary took up pirating in the late 1710s after pirates attacked the ship she worked on and she ended up serving the pirates instead. Mary later joined Calico Jack Rackam's ship and met another female pirate, Anne Bonny. She revealed her secret to Anne and they became fast friends. #PirateBFFs! Between them, they were a fearsome team.

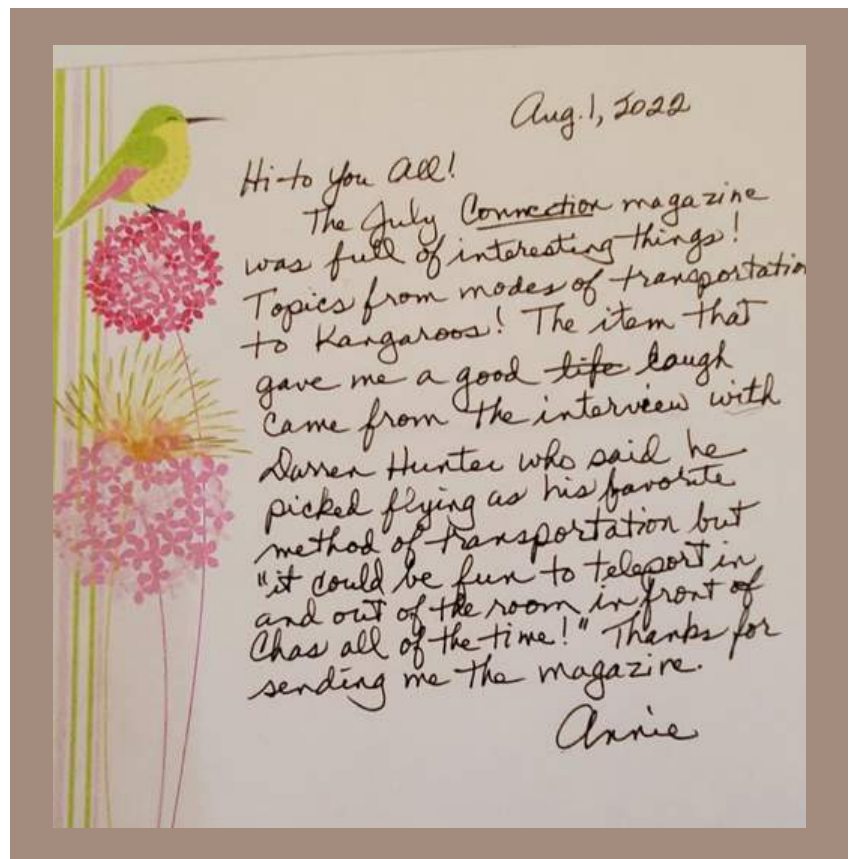
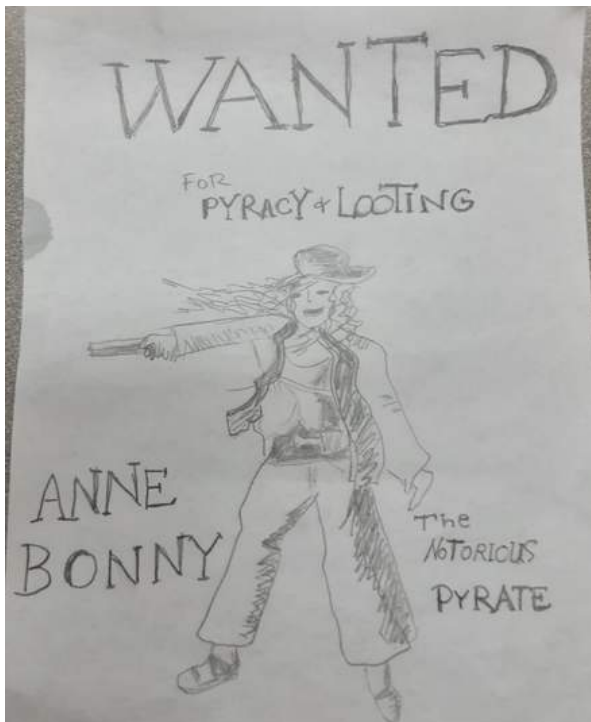
Anne Bonny began life in Ireland, and unlike her female pirate peers—she came from a relatively well-off family. She was an illegitimate child and she disguised herself as a boy in order to work as a clerk for her lawyer father. She ended up moving to America and married a sailor in 1718. She later left her husband for Calico Jack Rackam (aka "Calico Jack") who operated in the Bahamas and Cuba. Calico Jack must have been something to be able to lure both Anne and Mary!

Anne was known for a "fierce and courageous temper." There is a legend that she nearly beat a man to death when he tried to force himself onto her. Anne could keep up with male pirates—being-pirates from guzzling rum to cursing to wielding various weapons.

The real fun started when Anne and Mary met. They led raids on fishing and trading boats in the summer and fall of 1720. But alas, the she-pirate good times couldn't last forever, and Calico Jack's ship was captured by pirate hunters. Calico Jack and several other men were executed, but Anne and Mary both escaped execution by revealing they were each pregnant.

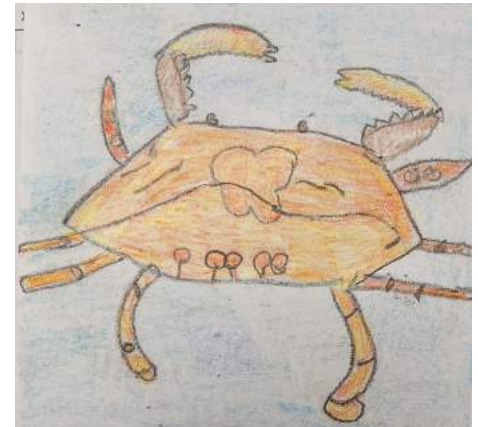
In Chris' art class we drew parrots. (Artists from left to right: Chris, Cindy, Russell, and Darnell.)
