What is your favorite holiday food?



After following news of its production closely, we held a cinema day (that turned into several days as technical difficulties abounded) to screen Weird: The Al Yankovic Story as a group. Weird was very much a parody of Weird Al's actual life, and many liberties were taken to tell an embellished story. Katie would have preferred a more factual biopic of Weird Al's life, particularly when making fun of pretty serious childhood traumas, and Connor says he did not think the movie was funny. Andrew appreciated the epic fight scene between Weird Al and drug cartel Pablo Escobar, which was an over-the-top parody of action movies. EGGS

We noshed on the world's most perfect protein-the egg. Here are some interesting egg facts:

- Harriet, a hen from the United Kingdom, laid the world's largest egg in 2010. Her astonishing egg measured 9.1 inches in diameter.
- The hen's diet determines the color of the yolk. Some producers feed natural supplements like marigold petals so that their hens lay eggs with brighter yolks.





 Chef hats traditionally have pleats equal to the number of ways that you can cook an egg.

- Brown eggs are more expensive because the hens that lay them are larger and eat more feed.
- To tell the difference between a raw egg and a hard cooked one, spin it. Hard cooked eggs spin easily, raw eggs wobble.
- If you drop an egg on the floor, you can sprinkle it heavily with salt for easy clean up.
- A hen turns her egg nearly 50 times a day to keep the yolk from sticking to the side.
- There are several reasons why commonly we eat chicken eggs instead of duck or turkey eggs. Chickens lay more eggs, they need less nesting space, and they don't have the strong mothering instincts of turkeys and ducks, which makes egg collection easier.
- Kiwis lay the largest eggs in relation to their body size of any species of bird.
- According to the Farmers' Almanac, eggshell colors have nothing to do with the flavor or nutritional value of the egg. Brown, white, and even blue and green eggshells are simply indicative of the breed of hen.
- Because older eggs have larger air cells, they're much easier to peel than fresh eggs.
- Even though many cartons promote that their eggs are free of hormones, this claim is nothing special. It's like saying that water is wet. That's because the FDA banned the use of hormones in all poultry production back in the 1950s. Therefore, no chicken eggs will ever contain hormones.

Q: Can you name all of Santa's reindeer?

A: No, they already have names!



Reindeer are well known as the engines that power Santa's sleigh on Christmas night, but what else do we know about them? Bert says they look like "Artie Antlers" - perhaps because of their famous headwear. "They have antlers, hooves, and a short tail" says Valerie, adding "They can only fly with Santa's help". So we know that they sort of look like deer, and that they rarely have illuminated noses or the ability to fly. But there's a lot more to these captivating critters than meets the eye.

Where do they live?

Reindeer love a chilly environment. They were first discovered living in Eastern Europe, Greenland, Russia, Northern China, Mongolia, and Scandinavia. They even used to live as far south as Idaho in the continental United States. Today they're really only found in Norway, Finland, Siberia, Greenland, Alaska, and Canada.

What do they eat?

Lichen! Lichen is a plant that grows on rocks and trees - sort of like a cross between moss and a fungus. Reindeer are actually the only mammals that can metabolize it, due to a special enzyme in their stomachs. They will eat leaves and grasses as well, when no lichen is available. They're also osteophagous, which means they sometimes eat their own antlers after they shed them.







What about their relationship with Santa Clause?

Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner and Blitzen are familiar names, especially in that specific order. The first Santa story that included his reindeer was called Old Santeclaus with Much Delight, published anonymously in 1821. In the story, Santa only has one reindeer to pull his sleigh.





Rudolph came later. Robert L. May wrote the story of the young reindeer's promotion to the front of the procession for the Montgomery Ward catalog in 1939. The company wanted him to come up with a character for a coloring book, and what he gave them was an iconic character that would become an integral part of America's cultural lexicon. Don't forget the song! Ten years after Rudolph appeared in print, his story was told by Gene Autry over the airwaves, rising to No. 1 during the 1949 Christmas season.


A Visit from St. Nicholas

Tofu-palooza

Tofu is also called *bean curd*. It originated in China and has been part of Chinese cuisine for over 2,000 years. Tofu is prepared by coagulating soy milk and then pressing the resulting curds into solid white blocks of varying softness; it can be silken, soft, firm, extra firm or super firm. The mixture is separated into solid pulp (*okara*) and soy "milk."

Tofu has a subtle flavor (some people say it has no flavor), so it can be used in savory *and* sweet dishes. Tofu is a good source of protein and contains all nine essential amino acids. It is also a valuable plant source of iron and calcium and the minerals manganese and phosphorous. In addition to this, it also contains magnesium, copper, zinc and vitamin B1.

The English word tofu comes from Japanese *tōfu*, a borrowing of Mandarin *dòufu* meaning "bean curd, bean ferment." The earliest documentation of the word in English is *towfu*, in a 1770 letter from the English merchant James Flint to Benjamin Franklin.

We ate tofu three ways:

- 1. Raw with soy sauce and ginger (pic top right)
- 2. Baked tofu, and
- 3. Tofu-based savory sauce over cooked cabbage and broccoliit's pure vegetable deliciousness according to those of us who had seconds *and third helpings!*. The recipe is on the next page.

Savory Sauce (from The Spot, Hermosa Beach)

Ingredients

- 3/4 cup Almond oil; (or safflower oil) [I used walnut oil once: yum]
- 3/4 cup Water
- 1/4 cup Liquid aminos; (I use soy sauce) [bragg's liquid aminos are very tasty...try some of mine]
- 1/8 cup Brewer's yeast
- 1/4 tsp Kelp [never can find this; recipe doesn't suffer w/o it]
- 1/4 tsp Spike seasoning [herb/vegetable salt substitute] [Mrs. Dash is good]
- o 1/4 tsp Basil
- 1/8 tsp Granulated garlic [I use garlic salt]
- 1-1/2 tsp Lemon juice
- 1 pkg. tofu, rinsed well (do not substitute Greek yogurt for the tofu, it will curdle when heated)

Steps

 Blend everything in the food processor or blender. Heat & serve over whatever.

Mantises

The name of the order of Mantises is called Mantodea. The Mantises' forelegs adapted for catching and gripping prey. female Mantises are known to eat their mate after mating. A martial arts style based on the Mantis was created in Asia. Mantises are the most commonly kept insect as a pet.

Naturally occurring Mantises provide plant pest control for gardeners that want to avoid using pesticides. Mantises can turn their heads 180 degrees. Mantises also eat spiders,frogs,lizards and even small birds. The Mantises' unique body shape makes them easy to camouflage as leaves and branches. The mantises' green coloring helps them camouflage with plants. One member of the Mantis species is the ghost mantis, which camouflages itself as dead dried up leaves.

The Malaysian Orchid Mantis camouflages itself in white flowers. One Mantis species, the Shield Mantis, looks exactly like a leaf.

A Snowless "Snowman"

Who doesn't love building a snowman? Snow is such a versatile building material–you can scoop it up one handful at a time, scrape it into shape with your fingers, and even use tools to carve it.


Unfortunately, it is rarely cold enough in our area to snow, and when it does it usually melts too quickly for us to play in it. So we decided we would build a snowman out of cardboard and then paint it white to look like snow.

In order to make a snowman out of flat material, like cardboard or even paper, we traced this shape that I printed out onto some large cardboard pieces.

We plan to make a total of 9 of them, folded along the lines and taped together, to make a round ball shape. We made this ball of cardboard in 3 different sizes for the 3 pieces of a snowman and then stacked them on top of each other.

Then we plan to paint them all white to mimic snow and get some sticks to push into the center part for arms, and paint some black circles for eyes and a mouth, and then make a carrot out of orange construction paper for the snowman's nose. We even bought a black top hat, just like the one Frosty the Snowman wears!
