Alice in Wonderland Day



July 4th is not only Independence Day, it's also Alice in Wonderland Day. In 1865, Lewis Carroll self-published *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* and the book has been in print since. In fact, the book has been translated into 176 languages. More interesting facts about Alice's adventures:

- There was a Real Alice. Alice Liddell, the daughter of Carroll's boss, Henry Liddell, was Alice's real-life inspiration.
- The manuscript was initially called *Alice's Adventures Under Ground*. Other potential titles included *Alice's Hour*

in Elf Land, Alice Among the Fairies, and Alice Among the Goblins. We talked about these titles and Amy said that if the title was Alice Among the Goblins, she would not have read that book.

- Carroll based the Dodo bird on himself, inspired by his real surname, Dodgson, and his stammer "Do-do-dodgson."
- Carroll suffered from a disorder causing hallucinations that made objects appear larger or smaller. The disease wasn't discovered until later (1955) and was named "Alice in Wonderland Syndrome."
- Carroll popularized phrases like "Mad as a Hatter" and "I'm late, I'm late, for a very important date!"



More Wonderland

 For Alice in Wonderland movie watchers, Alice in Carroll's book (like the real girl, Alice Liddell) was a brunette! (right). The 1951 Disney version of Alice in Wonderland depicted Alice as a blonde, so we tend to think of her that way.

For Carroll, an "obsessive photographer" (per the Metropolitan Museum of Art website), Alice Liddell was more than a favorite model; she was his "ideal child-friend." A photograph of Alice at age seven illustrated the last page of her copy of Alice's Adventures Underground.

July 12th is National Eat Your Jell-O Day, and while we personally don't think anybody needs to be prompted to eat their Jell-O, we were happy to research, cook and taste-test "America's Favorite Dessert".

Jell-O has been around a long, long time. The inventor of Jell-O originally made cough syrups and laxatives before pivoting to something sweeter in the late 1800's. Since then, gelatin desserts have done it all—they have been the height of luxuriousness, gone through a savory "salad" phase, become synonymous with hospitalization, and been slurped down in boozy shot form at many a party. Jell-O has sailed the seas, been carved into art, blasted off into outer space, and hit the silver screen in movies galore.

Once a fancy status symbol, a gelatin mold was one of the final desserts to be served aboard the Titanic. "Peaches in Chartreuse Jelly" was part of the 10 course meal on April 14, 1912, the very night the Titanic collided with an iceberg and sank. It was likely the showcase centerpiece of the dinner, with its bright green hue, elegant molded form, and garnish of edible flowers. While our minds went immediately to lime green Jell-O, chartreuse the color was actually named after an herbal French liqueur crafted by Carthusian monks in the 17th century. The dish would have had a spicy kick to it!

The 1950's saw a savory side of Jell-O, and savory Jell-O salads were all the rage. Molds of all shapes were filled with Jell-O dotted with tuna, tomatoes, celery, SPAM, olives, and boiled eggs, often with mayonnaise in the mix. Thankfully, these so-called salads have gone to their jiggly graves.


Jell-O has long been a mainstay on hospital menus. Jell-O is part of a clear liquid diet, which slows down digestion and can be used to prepare for medical tests or after surgery. Clear liquids also don't leave undigested food in the body. Jell-O's smooth texture and mild flavor can be easier to tolerate for people with sensitive stomachs or who are recovering from

surgery. It's also easy to swallow and digest, making it suitable for patients who have difficulty eating solid foods. And it's virus-friendly: gelatin can help regulate blood sugar, which can provide energy to help fight off sickness.



Eat Your Jell-O

Jell-O is ready for its close-up! The jiggly dessert has made many appearances in movies, tv shows, and even music videos, both as itself, and as a special effect. Perhaps the most iconic Jell-O featured in film is the green Jell-O jiggle of terror in Jurassic Park. Inventor Flint Lockwood makes a giant Jell-O house in Cloudy With a Chance of Meatballs for he and Sam Sparks to swim and smooch in. And who could forget the cat-food Jell-O mold Aunt Bethany gift-wraps in National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation? Jell-O's earliest movie role was in Cecil B. Demille's 1923 Biblical blockbuster The Ten Commandments, Moses parts a Red Sea of Jell-O. Grape Jell-O was used to dye the Horse of a Different Color in 1934's classic The Wizard of Oz (we are trying not to imagine what a grapey horse would smell like...) The UFO in Close Encounters of the Third Kind was created out of glass dishes filled with red Jell-O. And the "Primate Parfait" dessert of monkey brains in Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom was actually whipped cream, Jell-O and food coloring.








July 17th is World Emoji Day

Prop-making has become a popular addition to our Art curriculum this past year. The pieces we created have been displayed in elaborate yard decorations for the many holidays and themed weeks celebrated at the College. From the grim resting place of Edgar Allen Poe, shark infested waters, shipwrecked pirates and their plunder, to an enormous rainbow raining lucky gold coins, our rotating displays have certainly caught the eye of our community. Neighbors are always eagerly anticipating what we will come up with next!



Our most recent work has been a collaboration with The Community Church next door. Since last fall, we have shared our space with the church for their Sunday School program, which had previously been held in the parking lot. We were asked by Pastor Tim Seo if we would be interested in helping them with their Scuba themed Vacation Bible School decorations. Of course, we were very interested! July is our ocean-themed month, which Shark Week happens to fall in, so we knew everything we built would get a second run on display in our yard after VBS ended–twofer! We eagerly said yes and took a deep dive into all things underwater, on a mission to build a coral reef worthy of King Neptune himself.

To help spark our imagination and inspire our build, our prop-making team started by first

exploring coral reefs and learning more about the sea life that lives there. (What a great excuse to pop some popcorn, pull down the big screen and watch some Attenborough documentaries!) With a clear vision in mind, we gathered up our empty boxes and collected styrofoam pieces, rummaged around in the recycling bin perhaps more than is healthy, and bought up all the fluorescent paint we could get our

hands on. With a few additional thrifted finds and household items from The Dollar Tree, we went to work painting, carving, gluing and assembling our ambitious build.

At CH&S, anything is possible. With the imagination of our students and the support of our teachers, a styrofoam ice chest or a cardboard box can become just about anything. Through the wonderful world of prop-making, our imaginations bring some pretty incredible art to life!

Our prop department team includes Michelle, Jennifer, Nino, Randall, Adian, and newest addition Hayley, special build team of Bruce and Darren and Iris, plus Colleen, Cat and Zachary on display installation. Nino, Aiden and Hayley did an incredible job painting all the sea life we created using paper products, packing peanuts, and artificial plants and seashells. Randall put his paper mache skills to work on the boulder builds. Darren lent Bruce a hand making a sunken boat bow from a pallet Jennifer dragged down the alley in heels on her way back from the Project Center. Colleen and Zachary's keen eye for detail, and their energy and enthusiasm, came in handy during the two-day installation. It was unbelievable fun finding just the right nook or cranny for each of our critters!

Our final product included a five-tiered styrofoam rock arch, a large reef wall structure made from cardboard boxes and several cans of spray foam, plus a corner reef structure from a faux stone fountain Bruce rescued from the side of the road. There were half-a-dozen paper mache boulders, a large bubble and sea kelp forest strung from the gold arch we repurpose each holiday, two floor-to-ceiling coral reef panels and three half-sized panels. Top that all off with an abundance of urchins, anemones, coral, shells of all shapes and sizes, and underwater plant and animal life, and it all came together beautifully (if we do say so ourselves!)

Since it seems a shame to shove any of that into our storage shed just yet, we will have the coral reef on display in front of Life College at 837 Sweetser Ave. for the entire month of July, with added "sharkiness" to chum the waters for Shark Week. We welcome everyone to stop by and see our underwater wonderland for themselves—the pictures really don't do it justice!
