Easter Island



with Darnell

Darnell presented a class on Easter Island, or Rapa Nui, one of the most remote inhabited islands in the world, located over 2,000 miles off the coast of Chile. It's famous for its *moai*—nearly 1,000 massive stone statues carved by the Rapa Nui people between 1100 and 1600 CE. How these statues, some weighing over 80 tons, were transported miles across the island is still unknown.

The island's early society was complex, with a focus on ancestor worship, clan systems, and unique cultural practices. One fascinating tradition was the *Birdman cult*, a competition where contestants raced to grab the



first sooty tern egg of the season from a nearby islet. See picture of a sooty tern (right).

We took turns reading about the terns and the Birdman cult race which involves people sliding

downhill on banana trees, canoeing and horse riding!







Easter Island

Easter Island's population once faced collapse due to deforestation and overuse of resources. The island had contact with European explorers in the 18th century which led to major cultural disruptions.

Rapa Nui is now a UNESCO World Heritage site, and efforts are underway to preserve its heritage and language.

The mystery of how the moai statues were moved, and why many were toppled over, continues to capture imaginations worldwide.

We read about how the *tangata manu* race started hundreds of years ago and men would scale down a cliff, swim across the bay, find a seabird egg, swim back, climb the cliff and dash into the village to present their egg.

The leader was awarded the title of Birdman while some racers never made it out of the shark infested waters! Yikes!

power to you. 😝




Daniel and Joe's Nature Adventure

Daniel and Joe took a hike in the Indian Valley hills!






Unicorns appear in Scottish artwork, heraldry, and even on the coat of arms (below).





National Dolphin Day - April 14

TINY BANDITS:

THE SECRET LIVES OF FERRETS

Ferrets are curious, playful, and always up to something. Their name comes from *furittus*, Latin for "little thief," because they love to stash away anything they can carry—socks, keys, even food. They've been domesticated for over 2,500 years and were originally used to chase rabbits and rodents (vermin) out of burrows.

Ferrets have had some unusual jobs. Their ability to squeeze through tight spaces made them perfect for pulling wires—helping with Buckingham Palace's wiring during the wedding of Princess Diana and Prince Charles, a London concert, and even inside Boeing airplanes.

Did you know...?

- Sometimes, ferrets sleep so deeply they seem lifeless. They call it "ferret dead sleep."
- Ferret heartbeats are 200-250 beats per minute, which is much faster than humans.
- All baby ferrets start out white and develop color at 3 weeks.
- A male ferret is a *hob*, a female is a *jill*, and a group of ferrets is a *business* (fitting, since they're always busy).

Ferrets are illegal to own in California, Hawaii, New York City, and Washington D.C. due to concerns about escaped pets forming wild populations, though there's no real proof of that happening. Some states require a permit to own one.

Daniel has always wanted a ferret, but since they're illegal in California, Daniel might get

rabbits instead—

—he would get a male rabbit named *Samus* and a female named *Streaky*. And since Daniel already volunteers with rabbits at Marin Humane, he's off to a great start!
